

The highest proportion fall into age band 65+ with a count of 1,675 representing 18.39 % of the study area. The smallest proportion is in age band 15-19 with a count of 498 which represents 5.47 %. In the study area the most over represented age band in comparison to the base selection is 35-44 with an index value of 107. The band that is most under represented is 20-24 with an index of 94, where an index* of 100 represents the national average.




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
Within your area social grade DE forms the largest proportion with 1,161 people falling into this group, which is 37.88 % of the overall distribution. The smallest proportion falls into grade AB with a count of 332 taking up 10.82 %. When comparing this to the selected base the most over represented grade is DE with an index* count of 146, whereas the most under represented group is AB with an index count of 48.

Economic activity within the study area shows that 56.58 % of the population are employed, this is 3,698 people, compare this to your base where 54.65 % are employed. The smallest economically active group is Self employed with employees representing 0.92 %, compare this to the selected base where this group represents 2.33 %. When analysing index* values the most over represented group is Unemployed with an index of 154, taking up 3.23 %.


When considering economic inactivity the largest proportion in the study area belongs to the Retired group with a count of 910 representing 13.91 %. The smallest inactive group is Other with 176 which is 2.69 %. When looking at the index values the group that is most over represented is Other with an index of 114, representing 2.69 %.



1,533 households within your area live in a Semi-detached dwelling, this is 36.53 %. Compare this to a figure of 6,271,021 in your base making up 21.35 %. The smallest number of households live in a Detached dwelling, this is 270 households and makes up 6.43 %. When analysing the index* figures, we can deduce that the most over represented dwelling type is Semi-detached with a figure of 171, this makes up 36.53 % in the study area.



1,772 households within your area have an income of £19,999 or less, this forms 42.93 % of the overall distribution. The smallest count is 0 and these fall into household income band £100,000 to £149,999 making up 0.00 %. 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
