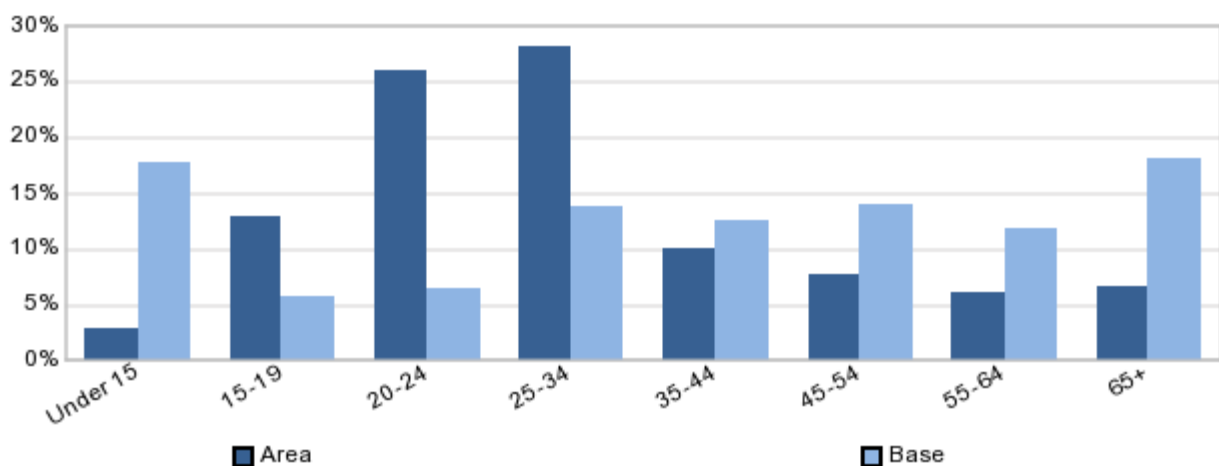

The highest proportion fall into age band 25-34 with a count of 3,888 representing 28.11 % of the study area. The smallest proportion is in age band Under 15 with a count of 394 which represents 2.85 %. In the study area the most over represented age band in comparison to the base selection is 20-24 with an index value of 405. The band that is most under represented is Under 15 with an index of 16, where an index* of 100 represents the national average.

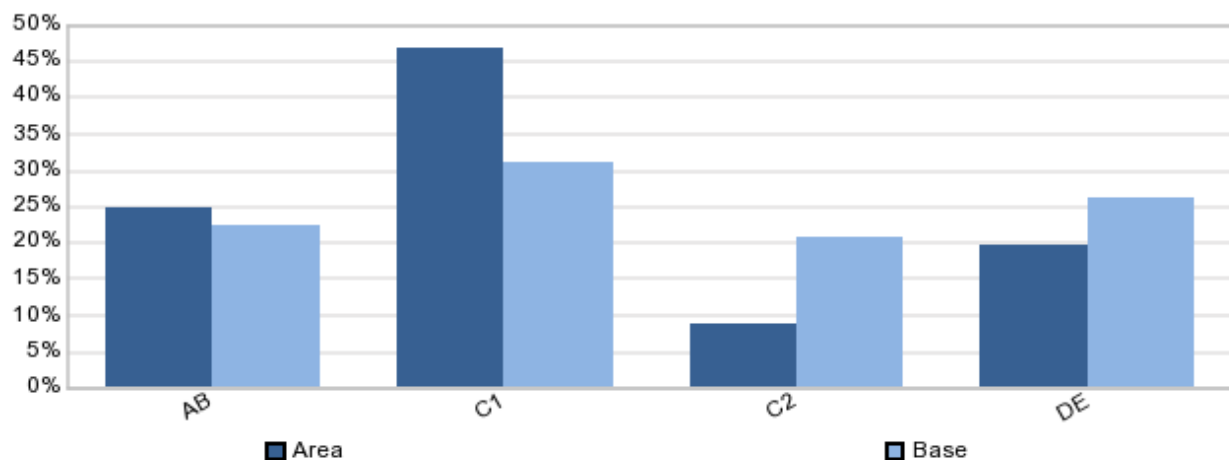

When comparing this to the selected base the most over represented grade is C1 with an index* count of 151, whereas the most under represented group is C2 with an index count of 42.

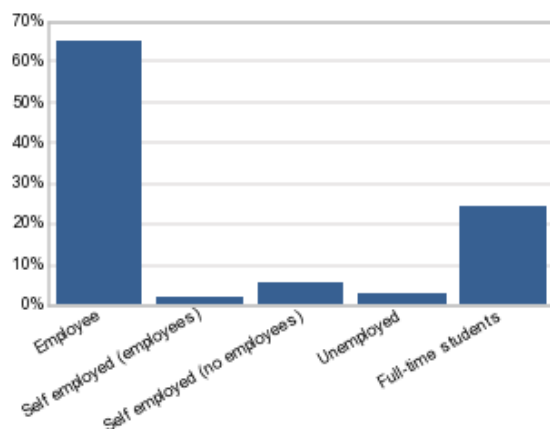

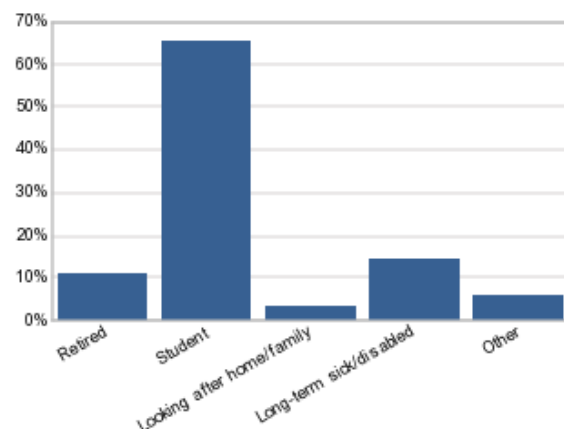

Economic activity within the study area shows that 36.80 % of the population are employed, this is 4,777 people, compare this to your base where 54.06 % are employed. The smallest economically active group is Self employed with employees representing 0.93 %, compare this to the selected base where this group represents 2.30 %. When analysing index* values the most over represented group is Full-time students with an index of 487, taking up 13.58 %.

When considering economic inactivity the largest proportion in the study area belongs to the Student group with a count of 3,721 representing 28.66 %. The smallest inactive group is Looking after home/ family with 186 which is 1.43 %. When looking at the index values the group that is most over represented is Student with an index of 341, representing 28.66 %.

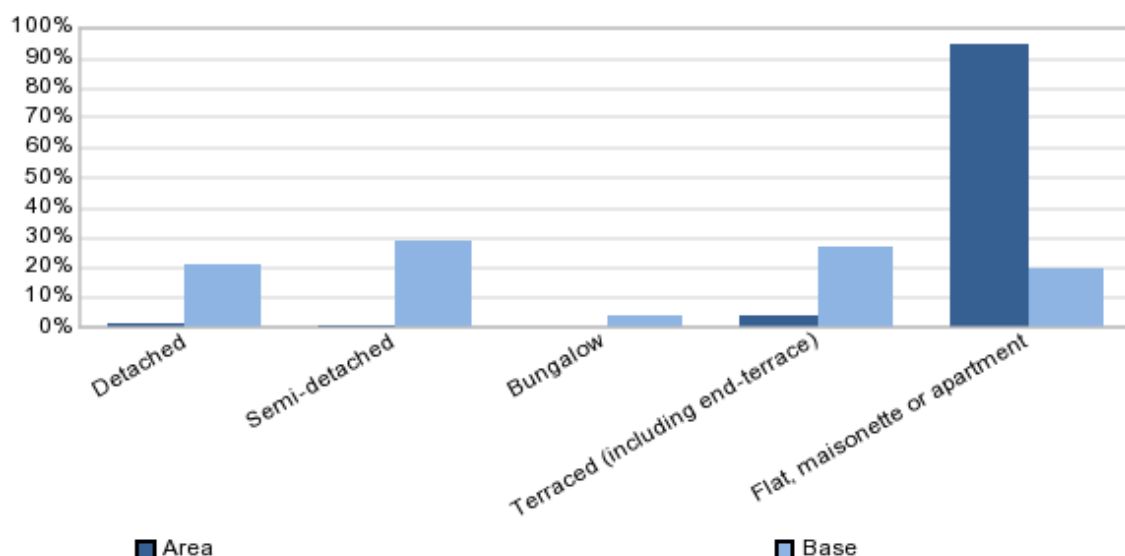

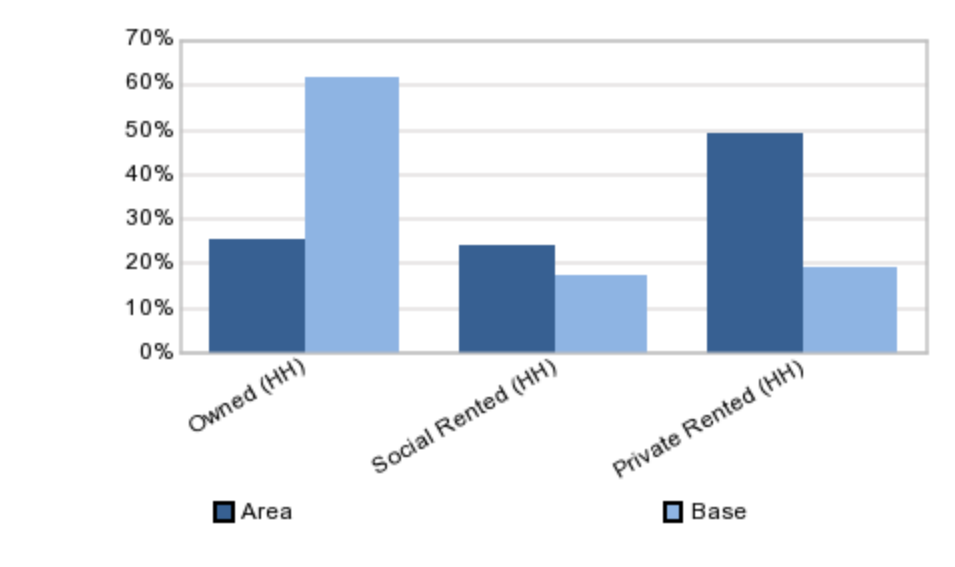

The smallest number of households live in a Bungalow dwelling, this is 0 households and makes up 0.00 %. When analysing the index* figures, we can deduce that the most over represented dwelling type is Flat, maisonette or apartment with a figure of 480, this makes up 94.34 % in the study area.

When considering the tenure of households we can see that the largest proportion are Private rented with a figure of 3,260 making up 49.19 %. The smallest amount fall into the Social rented at 23.93 %. When looking at the index figures the most over represented tenure type is Private Rented with an index of 255, 49.19 % of households fall into this category in the study area.

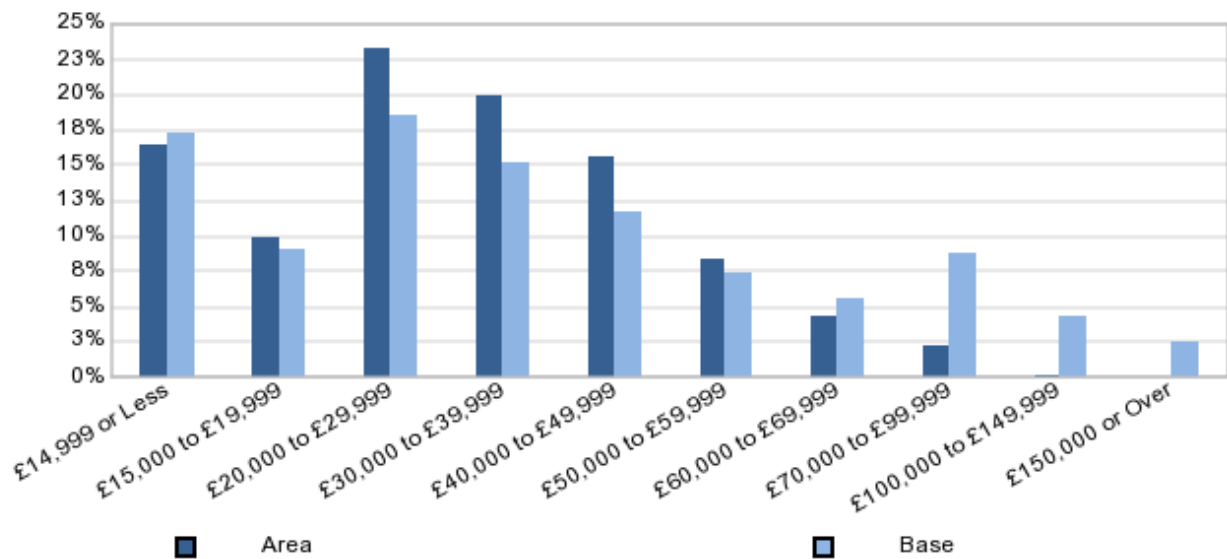

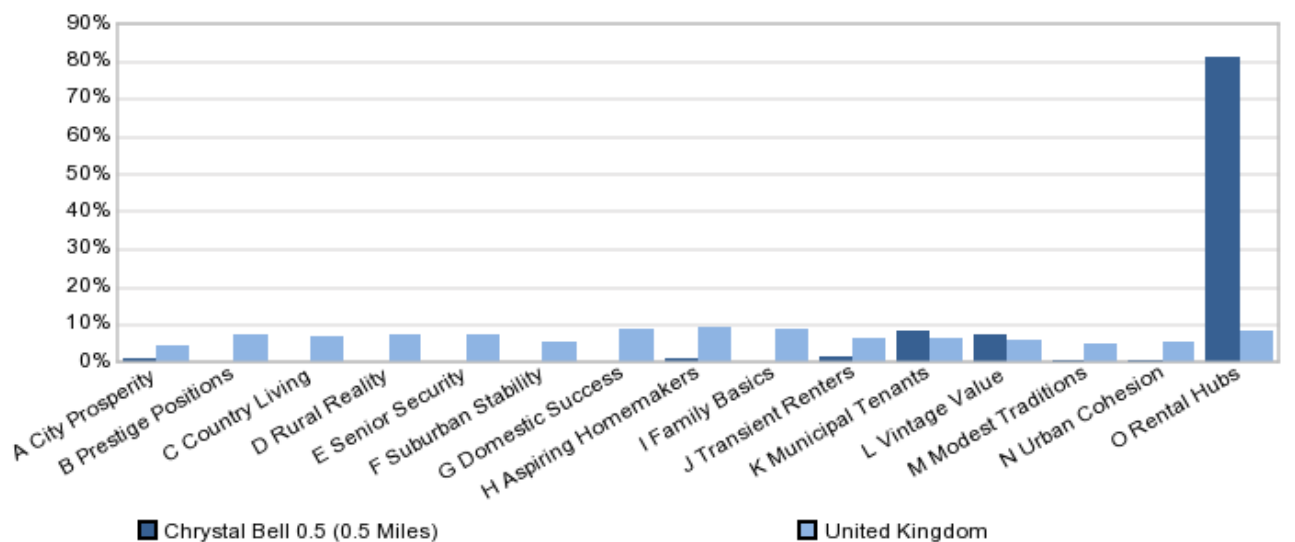
Understanding the residential profile by Mosaic UK 6
