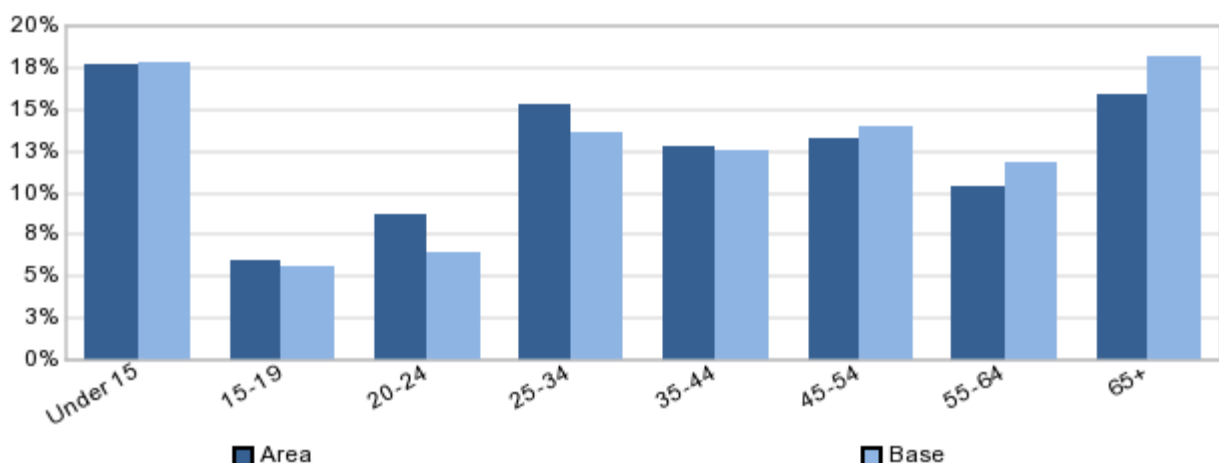

The highest proportion fall into age band Under 15 with a count of 37,804 representing 17.75 % of the study area. The smallest proportion is in age band 15-19 with a count of 12,693 which represents 5.96 %. In the study area the most over represented age band in comparison to the base selection is 20-24 with an index value of 136. The band that is most under represented is 65+ with an index of 88, where an index* of 100 represents the national average.

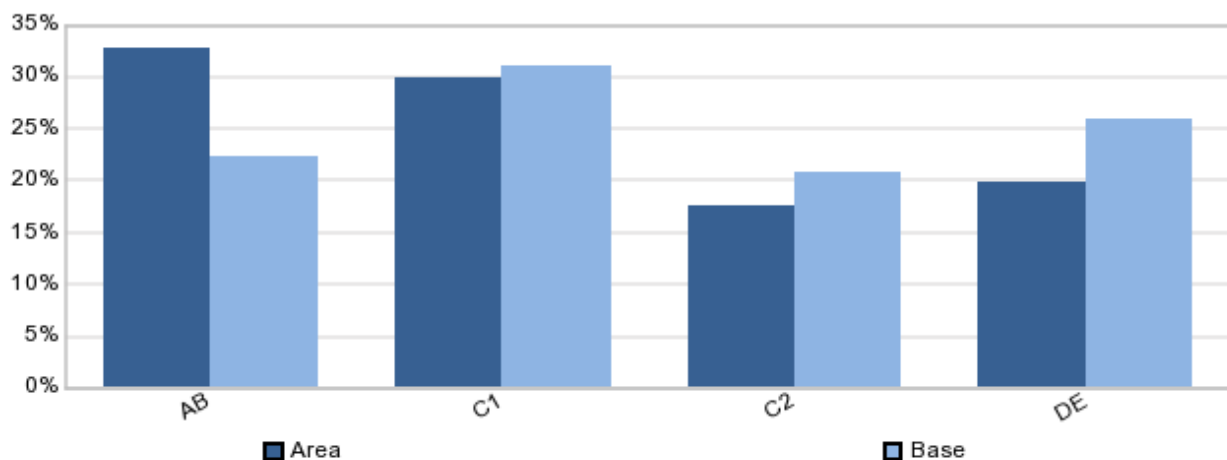
In the study area the largest ethnic group is White taking up 88.05 % of the population with a count of 187,567. This is in comparison to the selected base with 86.64 % of the population being White. The smallest ethnic representation in the study area was Gypsy / Traveller / Irish Traveller with a count of 177, compare this to the base selection where the smallest group was Gypsy / Traveller / Irish Traveller with a count of 68,310.

Within your area social grade AB forms the largest proportion with 21,379 people falling into this group, which is 32.82 % of the overall distribution. The smallest proportion falls into grade C2 with a count of 11,368 taking up 17.45 %. When comparing this to the selected base the most over represented grade is AB with an index* count of 147, whereas the most under represented group is DE with an index count of 76.

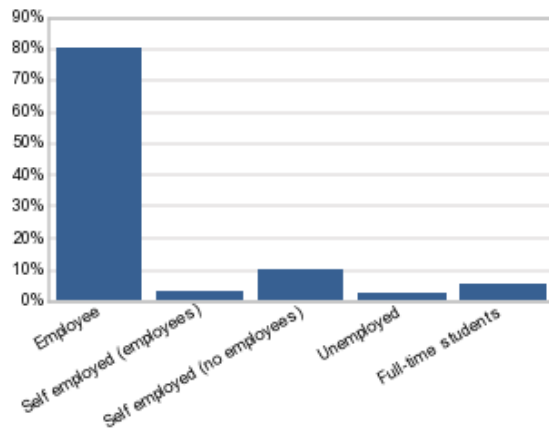

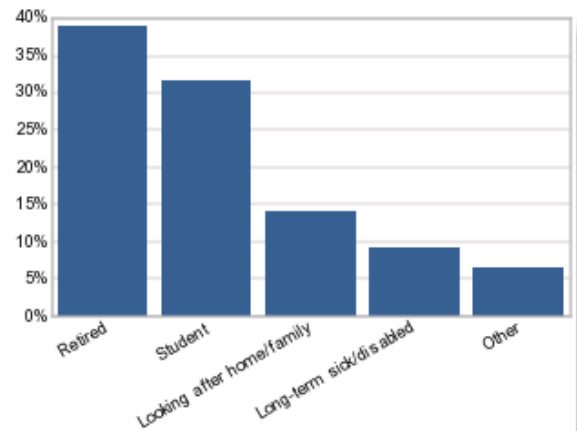

Economic activity within the study area shows that 58.62 % of the population are employed, this is 91,907 people, compare this to your base where 54.06 % are employed. The smallest economically active group is Unemployed representing 1.65 %, compare this to the selected base where this group represents 2.37 %. When analysing index* values the most over represented group is Full-time students with an index of 106, taking up 3.85 %.

When considering economic inactivity the largest proportion in the study area belongs to the Retired group with a count of 16,378 representing 10.45 %. The smallest inactive group is Other with 2,685 which is 1.71 %. When looking at the index values the group that is most over represented is Student with an index of 165, representing 8.49 %.

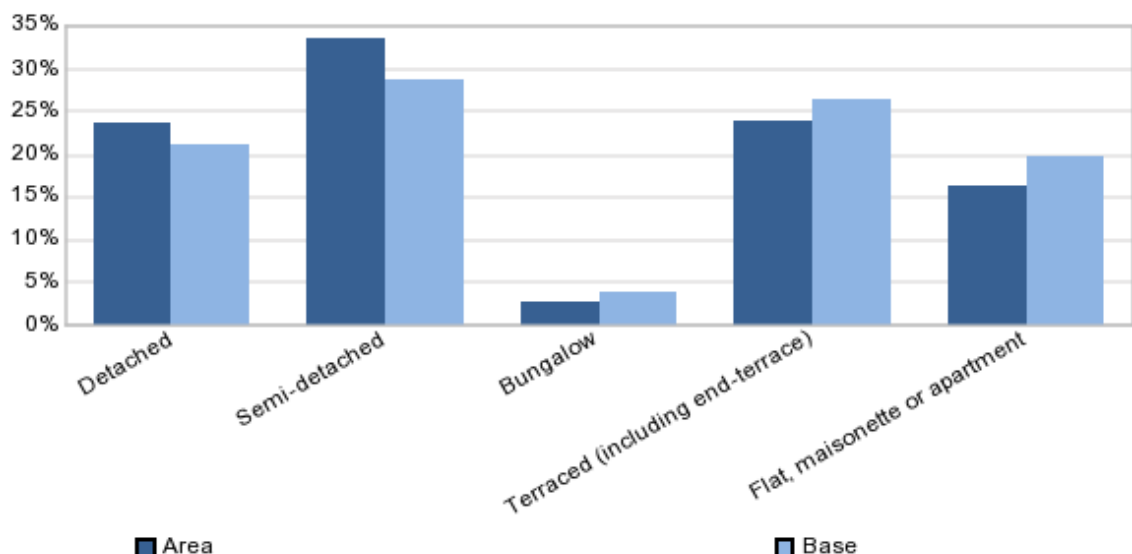

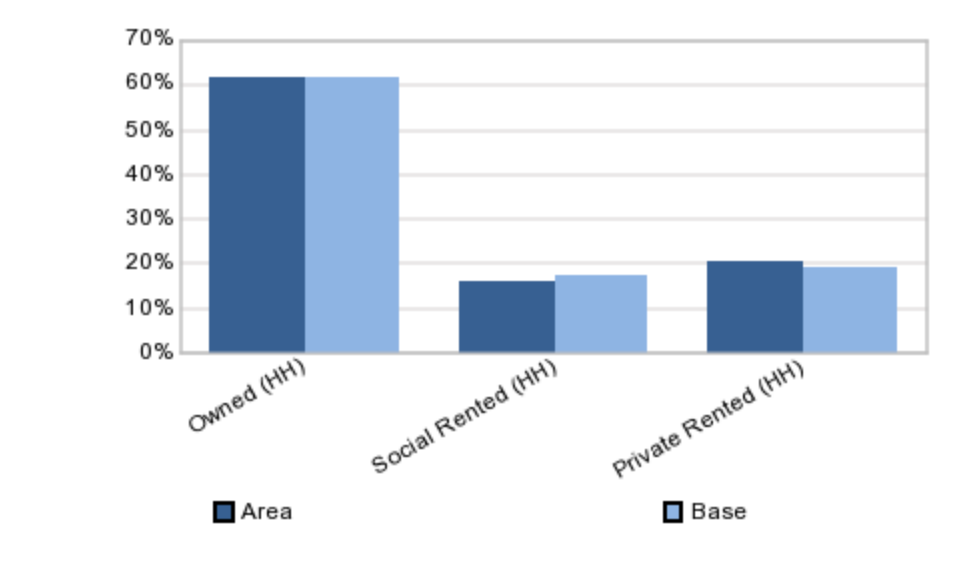

25,189 households within your area live in a Semi-detached dwelling, this is 33.40 %. Compare this to a figure of 7,344,686 in your base making up 28.83 %. The smallest number of households live in a Bungalow dwelling, this is 1,979 households and makes up 2.62 %. When analysing the index* figures, we can deduce that the most over represented dwelling type is Semi-detached with a figure of 116, this makes up 33.40 % in the study area.

When considering the tenure of households we can see that the largest proportion are Owned with a figure of 52,513 making up 61.63 %. The smallest amount fall into the Social rented at 16.38 %. When looking at the index figures the most over represented tenure type is Private Rented with an index of 107, 20.61 % of households fall into this category in the study area.

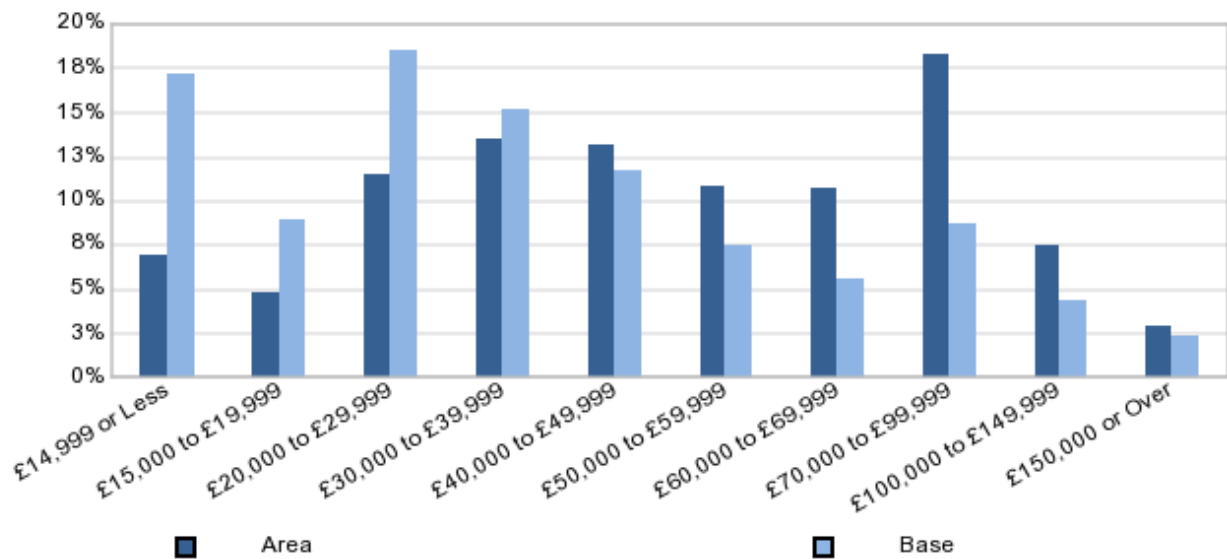

The smallest count is 2,508 and these fall into household income band £150,000 or Over making up 2.94 %. When using your base as a comparison, most households fall into the income band £20,000 to £29,999 which makes up 18.53 % of the overall view. When using index* figures as a guide we can see that the income band £70,000 to £99,999 is over represented making up 18.28 % with an index of 210, the most under represented banding is £14,999 or less with a figure of 40 making up 6.91 % of the distribution.

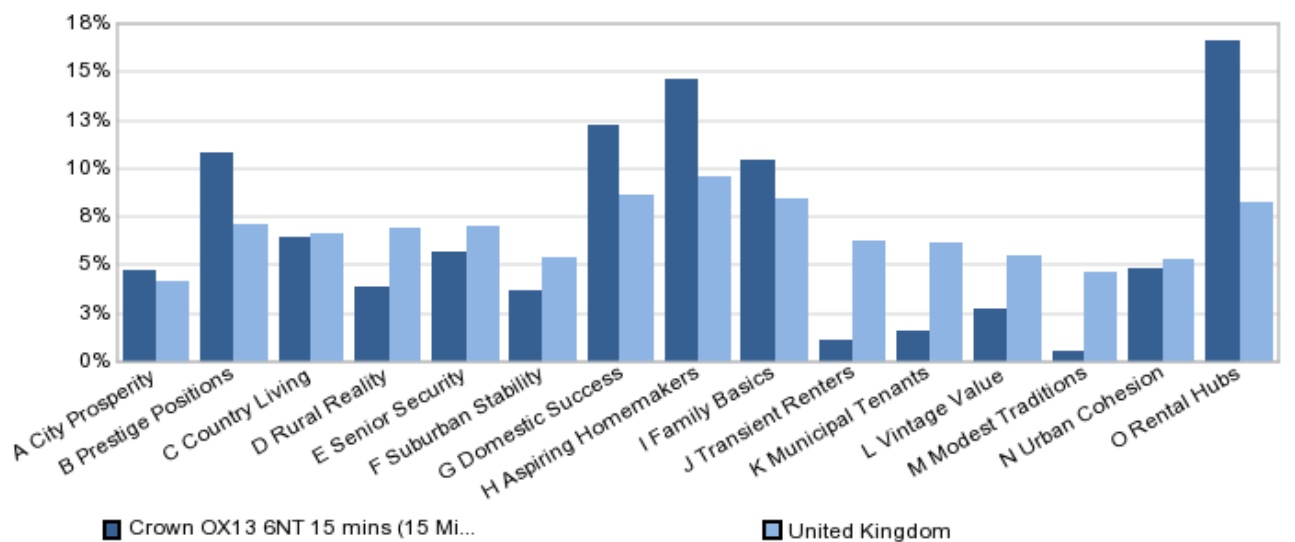
Understanding the residential profile by Mosaic UK 6

The largest group is O Rental Hubs with a count of 35,568 representing 16.70 % of the overall distribution, in comparison to the base where 8.21 % fall into this group. The smallest group is M Modest Traditions with a count of 1,196 which represents 0.56 %. The index* figures indicate that the most over represented group is O Rental Hubs taking up 16.70 % of the target area. In contrast the most under represented group is M Modest Traditions with just 0.56 %.
