

The highest proportion fall into age band 65+ with a count of 5,593 representing 31.64 % of the study area. The smallest proportion is in age band 20-24 with a count of 518 which represents 2.93 %. In the study area the most over represented age band in comparison to the base selection is 65+ with an index value of 174. The band that is most under represented is 20-24 with an index of 46, where an index\* of 100 represents the national average.



This is in comparison to the selected base with 86.64 % of the population being White. The smallest ethnic representation in the study area was Gypsy / Traveller / Irish Traveller with a count of 3, compare this to the base selection where the smallest group was Gypsy / Traveller / Irish Traveller with a count of 68,310.

Within your area social grade C1 forms the largest proportion with 1,449 people falling into this group, which is 28.19 % of the overall distribution. The smallest proportion falls into grade DE with a count of 1,033 taking up 20.11 %. When comparing this to the selected base the most over represented grade is C2 with an index\* count of 131, whereas the most under represented group is DE with an index count of 78.



Economic activity within the study area shows that 48.52 % of the population are employed, this is 6,316 people, compare this to your base where 54.06 % are employed. The smallest economically active group is Unemployed representing 0.84 %, compare this to the selected base where this group represents 2.37 %. When analysing index\* values the most over represented group is Employee with an index of 233, taking up 5.48 %.


When considering economic inactivity the largest proportion in the study area belongs to the Retired group with a count of 2,689 representing 20.66 %. The smallest inactive group is Other with 154 which is 1.18 %. When looking at the index values the group that is most over represented is Retired with an index of 161, representing 20.66 %.



1,468 households within your area live in a Semi-detached dwelling, this is 20.82 %. Compare this to a figure of 7,344,686 in your base making up 28.83 %. The smallest number of households live in a Bungalow dwelling, this is 497 households and makes up 7.05 %. When analysing the index\* figures, we can deduce that the most over represented dwelling type is Detached with a figure of 176, this makes up 37.19 % in the study area.


When considering the tenure of households we can see that the largest proportion are Owned with a figure of 5,681 making up 68.43 %. The smallest amount fall into the Social rented at 10.25 %. When looking at the index figures the most over represented tenure type is Owned with an index of 111, 68.43 % of households fall into this category in the study area.

1,341 households within your area have an income of £19,999 or less, this forms 16.15 % of the overall distribution. The smallest count is 119 and these fall into household income band £150,000 or Over making up 1.43 %. When using your base as a comparison, most households fall into the income band £20,000 to £29,999 which makes up 18.53 % of the overall view. When using index\* figures as a guide we can see that the income band £70,000 to £99,999 is over represented making up 13.12 % with an index of 151, the most under represented banding is £14,999 or less with a figure of 58 making up 10.02 % of the distribution.


# Understanding the residential profile by Mosaic UK 6
