

The highest proportion fall into age band 65+ with a count of 1,551 representing 29.57 % of the study area. The smallest proportion is in age band 15-19 with a count of 192 which represents 3.67 %. In the study area the most over represented age band in comparison to the base selection is 65+ with an index value of 162. The band that is most under represented is 15-19 with an index of 66, where an index* of 100 represents the national average.






Within your area social grade DE forms the largest proportion with 671 people falling into this group, which is 43.13 % of the overall distribution. The smallest proportion falls into grade AB with a count of 109 taking up 6.98 %. When comparing this to the selected base the most over represented grade is DE with an index* count of 166, whereas the most under represented group is AB with an index count of 31.

Economic activity within the study area shows that 49.19 % of the population are employed, this is 1,868 people, compare this to your base where 54.06 % are employed. The smallest economically active group is Self employed with employees representing 0.94 %, compare this to the selected base where this group represents 2.30 %. When analysing index* values the most over represented group is Unemployed with an index of 129, taking up 2.61 %.


When considering economic inactivity the largest proportion in the study area belongs to the Retired group with a count of 886 representing 23.33 %. The smallest inactive group is Other with 90 which is 2.37 %. When looking at the index values the group that is most over represented is Retired with an index of 130, representing 23.33 %.



950 households within your area live in a Semi-detached dwelling, this is 40.99 %. Compare this to a figure of 7,344,686 in your base making up 28.83 %. The smallest number of households live in a Flat, maisonette or apartment dwelling, this is 137 households and makes up 5.91 %. When analysing the index* figures, we can deduce that the most over represented dwelling type is Bungalow with a figure of 411, this makes up 16.78 % in the study area.


When considering the tenure of households we can see that the largest proportion are Owned with a figure of 1,523 making up 60.27 %. The smallest amount fall into the Private rented at 12.76 %. When looking at the index figures the most over represented tenure type is Social Rented with an index of 141, 24.77 % of households fall into this category in the study area.

1,368 households within your area have an income of £19,999 or less, this forms 54.14 % of the overall distribution. The smallest count is 0 and these fall into household income band £100,000 to £149,999 making up 0.00 %. When using your base as a comparison, most households fall into the income band £20,000 to £29,999 which makes up 18.53 % of the overall view. When using index* figures as a guide we can see that the income band £14,999 or less is over represented making up 40.74 % with an index of 236, the most under represented banding is £100,000 to £149,999 with a figure of 0 making up 0.00 % of the distribution.


