The highest proportion fall into age band 25-34 with a count of 1,689 representing 18.20 % of the study area. The smallest proportion is in age band 15-19 with a count of 335 which represents 3.61 %. In the study area the most over represented age band in comparison to the base selection is 25-34 with an index value of 134. The band that is most under represented is 15-19 with an index of 66, where an index* of 100 represents the national average.

Within your area social grade C1 forms the largest proportion with 1,095 people falling into this group, which is 32.10 % of the overall distribution. The smallest proportion falls into grade C2 with a count of 636 taking up 18.66 %. When comparing this to the selected base the most over represented grade is AB with an index* count of 133, whereas the most under represented group is DE with an index count of 75.

Economic activity within the study area shows that 63.02 % of the population are employed, this is 4,426 people, compare this to your base where 54.65 % are employed. The smallest economically active group is Unemployed representing 2.11 %, compare this to the selected base where this group represents 2.19 %. When analysing index* values the most over represented group is Employee with an index of 103, taking up 63.02 %.

When considering economic inactivity the largest proportion in the study area belongs to the Retired group with a count of 732 representing 10.42 %. The smallest inactive group is Other with 99 which is 1.41 %. When looking at the index values the group that is most over represented is Retired with an index of 108, representing 10.42 %.

673 households within your area live in a Semi-detached dwelling, this is 15.19 %. Compare this to a figure of 6,271,021 in your base making up 21.35 %. The smallest number of households live in a Bungalow dwelling, this is 182 households and makes up 4.09 %. When analysing the index* figures, we can deduce that the most over represented dwelling type is Terraced with a figure of 153, this makes up 36.85 % in the study area.

When considering the tenure of households we can see that the largest proportion are Owned with a figure of 2,686 making up 60.43 %. The smallest amount fall into the Social rented at 9.15 %. When looking at the index figures the most over represented tenure type is Private Rented with an index of 148, 29.41 % of households fall into this category in the study area.

The smallest count is 28 and these fall into household income band £150,000 or Over making up 0.62 %. When using your base as a comparison, most households fall into the income band £20,000 to £29,999 which makes up 19.59 % of the overall view. When using index* figures as a guide we can see that the income band £60,000 to £69,999 is over represented making up 8.99 % with an index of 159, the most under represented banding is £150,000 or Over with a figure of 44 making up 0.62 % of the distribution.
