

The highest proportion fall into age band 65+ with a count of 132 representing 37.99 % of the study area. The smallest proportion is in age band 20-24 with a count of 7 which represents 2.15 %. In the study area the most over represented age band in comparison to the base selection is 65+ with an index value of 209. The band that is most under represented is 25-34 with an index of 17, where an index* of 100 represents the national average.


The ONS data shows the ethnic make up of your area is Compare this to your base ethnic diversity as follows:



Within your area social grade AB forms the largest proportion with 36 people falling into this group, which is 38.95 % of the overall distribution. The smallest proportion falls into grade DE with a count of 13 taking up 14.23 %. When comparing this to the selected base the most over represented grade is AB with an index* count of 174, whereas the most under represented group is DE with an index count of 55.

Economic activity within the study area shows that 42.40 % of the population are employed, this is 108 people, compare this to your base where 54.06 % are employed. The smallest economically active group is Full-time students representing 0.45 %, compare this to the selected base where this group represents 3.46 %. When analysing index* values the most over represented group is Employee with an index of 265, taking up 5.13 %.


When considering economic inactivity the largest proportion in the study area belongs to the Retired group with a count of 69 representing 27.07 %. The smallest inactive group is Other with 5 which is 1.97 %. When looking at the index values the group that is most over represented is Retired with an index of 146, representing 27.07 %.



49 households within your area live in a Semi-detached dwelling, this is 35.85 %. Compare this to a figure of 7,344,686 in your base making up 28.83 %. The smallest number of households live in a Flat, maisonette or apartment dwelling, this is 1 households and makes up 0.41 %. When analysing the index* figures, we can deduce that the most over represented dwelling type is Bungalow with a figure of 280, this makes up 11.40 % in the study area.



26 households within your area have an income of £19,999 or less, this forms 16.33 % of the overall distribution. The smallest count is 6 and these fall into household income band £150,000 or Over making up 3.49 %. When using your base as a comparison, most households fall into the income band £20,000 to £29,999 which makes up 18.53 % of the overall view. When using index* figures as a guide we can see that the income band £100,000 to £149,999 is over represented making up 7.18 % with an index of 167, the most under represented banding is £14,999 or less with a figure of 48 making up 8.33 % of the distribution.


Understanding the residential profile by Mosaic UK 6
