

The highest proportion fall into age band 65+ with a count of 1,124 representing 18.90 % of the study area. The smallest proportion is in age band 15-19 with a count of 298 which represents 5.01 %. In the study area the most over represented age band in comparison to the base selection is 55-64 with an index value of 117. The band that is most under represented is Under 15 with an index of 88, where an index\* of 100 represents the national average.






Within your area social grade C1 forms the largest proportion with 662 people falling into this group, which is 33.56 % of the overall distribution. The smallest proportion falls into grade C2 with a count of 383 taking up 19.42 %. When comparing this to the selected base the most over represented grade is C1 with an index\* count of 108, whereas the most under represented group is C2 with an index count of 93.

Economic activity within the study area shows that 56.91 % of the population are employed, this is 2,555 people, compare this to your base where 54.06 % are employed. The smallest economically active group is Self employed with employees representing 1.62 %, compare this to the selected base where this group represents 2.30 %. When analysing index\* values the most over represented group is Unemployed with an index of 149, taking up 3.56 %.


When considering economic inactivity the largest proportion in the study area belongs to the Retired group with a count of 693 representing 15.43 %. The smallest inactive group is Other with 96 which is 2.13 %. When looking at the index values the group that is most over represented is Retired with an index of 117, representing 15.43 %.



720 households within your area live in a Semi-detached dwelling, this is 30.18 %. Compare this to a figure of 7,344,686 in your base making up 28.83 %. The smallest number of households live in a Bungalow dwelling, this is 21 households and makes up 0.89 %. When analysing the index\* figures, we can deduce that the most over represented dwelling type is Flat, maisonette or apartment with a figure of 134, this makes up 26.38 % in the study area.


When considering the tenure of households we can see that the largest proportion are Owned with a figure of 1,775 making up 66.12 %. The smallest amount fall into the Private rented at 13.33 %. When looking at the index figures the most over represented tenure type is Social Rented with an index of 109, 19.08 % of households fall into this category in the study area.

926 households within your area have an income of £19,999 or less, this forms 34.52 % of the overall distribution. The smallest count is 1 and these fall into household income band £150,000 or Over making up 0.05 %. When using your base as a comparison, most households fall into the income band £20,000 to £29,999 which makes up 18.53 % of the overall view. When using index\* figures as a guide we can see that the income band £14,999 or less is over represented making up 24.66 % with an index of 143, the most under represented banding is £150,000 or Over with a figure of 2 making up 0.05 % of the distribution.


### Understanding the residential profile by Mosaic UK 6
