

The highest proportion fall into age band 65+ with a count of 581 representing 23.03 % of the study area. The smallest proportion is in age band 20-24 with a count of 101 which represents 4.00 %. In the study area the most over represented age band in comparison to the base selection is 65+ with an index value of 127. The band that is most under represented is 20-24 with an index of 62, where an index\* of 100 represents the national average.


The ONS data shows the ethnic make up of your area is Compare this to your base ethnic diversity as follows: as follows:




Within your area social grade C1 forms the largest proportion with 227 people falling into this group, which is 29.20 % of the overall distribution. The smallest proportion falls into grade DE with a count of 163 taking up 20.99 %. When comparing this to the selected base the most over represented grade is C2 with an index\* count of 116, whereas the most under represented group is DE with an index count of 81.

Economic activity within the study area shows that 47.43 % of the population are employed, this is 849 people, compare this to your base where 54.06 % are employed. The smallest economically active group is Unemployed representing 1.90 %, compare this to the selected base where this group represents 2.37 %. When analysing index\* values the most over represented group is Self employed without employees with an index of 195, taking up 14.97 %.


When considering economic inactivity the largest proportion in the study area belongs to the Retired group with a count of 283 representing 15.82 %. The smallest inactive group is Other with 34 which is 1.87 %. When looking at the index values the group that is most over represented is Retired with an index of 122, representing 15.82 %.



The smallest number of households live in a Bungalow dwelling, this is 39 households and makes up 4.07 %. When analysing the index\* figures, we can deduce that the most over represented dwelling type is Terraced with a figure of 166, this makes up 43.70 % in the study area.



432 households within your area have an income of £19,999 or less, this forms 37.86 % of the overall distribution. The smallest count is 2 and these fall into household income band £150,000 or Over making up 0.15 %. When using your base as a comparison, most households fall into the income band £20,000 to £29,999 which makes up 18.53 % of the overall view. When using index\* figures as a guide we can see that the income band £14,999 or less is over represented making up 25.19 % with an index of 146, the most under represented banding is £150,000 or Over with a figure of 6 making up 0.15 % of the distribution.


#### Understanding the residential profile by Mosaic UK 6
