

The highest proportion fall into age band 65+ with a count of 215 representing 20.09 % of the study area. The smallest proportion is in age band 15-19 with a count of 45 which represents 4.20 %. In the study area the most over represented age band in comparison to the base selection is 55-64 with an index value of 172. The band that is most under represented is Under 15 with an index of 59, where an index\* of 100 represents the national average.







Economic activity within the study area shows that 57.17 % of the population are employed, this is 504 people, compare this to your base where 54.42 % are employed. The smallest economically active group is Unemployed representing 1.11 %, compare this to the selected base where this group represents 2.34 %. When analysing index\* values the most over represented group is Employee with an index of 131, taking up 2.98 %.

When considering economic inactivity the largest proportion in the study area belongs to the Retired group with a count of 167 representing 18.91 %. The smallest inactive group is Looking after home/ family with 20 which is 2.27 %. When looking at the index values the group that is most over represented is Retired with an index of 138, representing 18.91 %.





135 households within your area live in a Semi-detached dwelling, this is 31.19 %. Compare this to a figure of 6,267,067 in your base making up 29.35 %. The smallest number of households live in a Flat, maisonette or apartment dwelling, this is 6 households and makes up 1.41 %. When analysing the index\* figures, we can deduce that the most over represented dwelling type is Detached with a figure of 144, this makes up 28.19 % in the study area.

When considering the tenure of households we can see that the largest proportion are Owned with a figure of 382 making up 80.25 %. The smallest amount fall into the Social rented at 2.35 %. When looking at the index figures the most over represented tenure type is Owned with an index of 130, 80.25 % of households fall into this category in the study area.




